DIRECTIONS: Here is a sample monologue. Read through it first for content, and utilize the script analysis lesson resources (Given Circumstance worksheet, Obstacles & Intentions, and Super Objective), *then* break the monologue down into "beats," or areas of critical pause. Beats are helpful if a character needs to stop and think, tension is building, or if a character needs to emote in a non verbal way. Utilize the "Inner Visualization storyboard" worksheet as part of this lesson to practice conscious memory, as well as beat break-down.
